The first half of 2008 saw the culmination of planning and projects begun in 2007, as well as some good new developments and some excellent professional learning opportunities.

By March, Trish Montgomery had organised our archives. In addition to properly storing and documenting our holdings, Trish provided us with recommendations for ongoing archiving and also volunteered to store and organise our archives up to and including this AGM. Many thanks must go to Trish for her diligent and generous assistance in this area. The archives will now be stored by the president.

After some changes made late in 2007, the AISWA Libraries website <http://www.aiswalibraries.org.au> has been readily accessible and problem free. Our thanks must go to Anne Bourke, who has continued on as an advisory committee member to continue maintaining the website for us in 2008.

At our first meeting in February we welcomed Michelle Pritchard, who also joined us in an advisory capacity. Michelle proved a valuable member of the committee, organising for prompt and economical printing and postage of our newsletter and bringing fresh ideas regarding professional learning. I would like to thank Michelle for her ready assistance and support.

Our newsletter editor, Dee Cunninghame, continued to do a wonderfully professional job of producing timely and informative newsletters on our behalf. I would like to thank Dee for her ongoing dedication, collegiality and support.

The Database Consortium continues to be an important function of our organisation and thanks must again go to Joan Overman and Margaret Chapple, for their ongoing management of this. There are now 12 major suppliers, providing a large number of significant online resources. Participating AISWA and non AISWA schools can benefit from discounts of up to 25% off subscriptions, so please check out the information included with the October newsletter, or on the AISWA Libraries website.

Professional Learning was a key feature of 2008. In Term 1 we organised "Sex, Suicide and the

Teacher Librarian", featuring Brian Beare, Chloe Mauer, Kate McCaffery and Frank Sheehan. This informative and thought provoking panel discussion about young adult literature and censorship was ably chaired by Pam Buselich, and was held at St Hilda's, which gave us all the chance to see how attractive and welcoming a modernised school library can be. Many thanks must go to Judy Christopher for her effort in hosting this popular event.

On 13 and 14 June was the School Library Conference, organised jointly with WASLA. Many thanks must go to Margaret Ryan, who served with me on the conference organising committee. Through keynote speakers Kevin Hennah and Dr Jim Mulaney and a host of other presenters and authors, bus tours to bookshops and libraries, hands-on practical sessions, trade exhibitions and the opportunity to network, we did our best to provide learning opportunities in all aspects of teacher librarianship. The conference was hosted by Wesley College, and the feedback received indicated that it was a resounding success.

Much planning went into our third term professional development opportunity – the one day seminar presented by Dr Ross Todd, at the Perth Convention Centre in September. AISWA Libraries was pleased to be able to heavily subsidise the registration fee for our member schools, thereby facilitating the attendance of more than 80 teacher librarians from around the state. I would like to sincerely thank Sue Cameron for her key role in organising this event.

There are many different responsibilities and tasks involved in running an organisation such as AISWA Libraries and I would like to thank everyone on the committee for their input and assistance during my time as President. Many thanks must go to our excellent Secretary Mimma Sardi, for her professionalism and collegiality. Sue Cameron must also be thanked for her ongoing dedication in the role of Treasurer. To Dee Cunninghame, Joan Overman, Anne Bourke, Margaret Ryan, Michelle Pritchard, Judy Christopher, Penny Worthington, Gary Green and Margaret Chapple, thank you all very much for your contributions.

To those who are stepping down, a special thanks for your long service, and best wishes for your future plans. To the new committee members for 2009, I feel sure AISWA Libraries will be in extremely capable hands and I wish you all the best for the year ahead. # Caretaker President's Report from the AGM held at Mercedes College on Thursday 13 November 2008.

Following Cathy Dale's resignation at the committee meeting on 31 July, I agreed to assume the role of president for the remainder of 2008.

Planning was well under way for the Ross Todd Seminar, "Leading Learning: a guided inquiry approach", held at the Conference Centre on September 1. The committee had previously resolved to heavily subsidise registration for all attendees from AISWA Libraries schools. Sue Cameron liaised with Syba Signs to bring Ross to Perth for the seminar and took care of the many details involved in hosting such a successful seminar. Thanks are also due to Margaret Ryan who helped Sue coordinate on the day. A few committee members enjoyed a meal with Ross on the Sunday evening before the seminar. More than eighty teachers and teacher librarians attended the big day. Ross is likely to return to Perth in May 2009 to introduce another stage of guided inquiry through workshop. It is yet to be decided whether AISWA Libraries will host the session.

It was resolved by committee not to call for nominations for the Jean Rhodes Award in 2008 as by August, the deadline set for nominations had already passed and we thought it inappropriate to put pressure on nominees and principals to respond within unrealistic timeframes. Last year, Michelle Gibbings, Robin Wake and I revised the criteria and process with the intention of making the award more inclusive and promoting and advertising its existence to a wider audience. We also introduced a checklist for principals. Penny Worthington and Gary Green are in the process of fine tuning documents and will provide a checklist for nominators so that all candidates commence the selection process from a level playing field. A section of our website provides further details of the award and this will be kept up-to-date as changes are made.

Dee Cunninghame suggested to committee that a calendar of relevant dates be compiled. Members have since forwarded details of responsibilities and scheduled deadlines for all tasks to Penny Worthington. The calendar and schedules should ensure that responsibilities can be transferred between members more easily and make all members aware of important deadlines to be met.

Our newsletter has become more streamlined, attractive and informative. Thanks are due to Dee Cunninghame who has continued as editor, Margaret Ryan as proof reader and Michelle Pritchard who has been responsible for both production and distribution.

We have resolved to work closely with WASLA to meet common goals and as the national ASLA Conference will be held in Perth next year from 29 September to 2 October, there should be plenty of opportunities.

Joan Overman and I have again organized the AISWA Libraries Database Consortium which continues to offer substantial discounts to all Western Australian schools. There are now 12 suppliers and 103 products vying for our scarce funds. Intention forms are due today and at this stage we have 46 participating schools. The range and quality of information and variety of media types that these resources offer our students *anywhere* within our campuses and also from their homes at *any time* seems to indicate that they deserve a prominent position within our virtual libraries. This year, Judy Christopher will be completing the data entries and sending reports to the suppliers.

My role as President has been a pleasurable one thanks to the generous and able assistance of committee members: Mimma Sardi (Secretary) Sue Cameron (Treasurer), Dee Cunninghame, Michelle Pritchard, Penny Worthington, Margaret Ryan, Judy Christopher, Gary Green and Joan Overman and our web manager, Anne Bourke. As retiring committee members, Mimma, Sue, Margaret, Joan and I are particularly happy to have been able to attract so many new committee members. It augurs well for AISWA Libraries Inc. in 2009.

Thanks to Margaret Ryan and Mercedes College for hosting our AGM.

Natalie Portman from Dymocks in Claremont brought a selection of good Christmas reads to the AGM. Natalie's book talks are always witty and informative. The following were some of her selections for us.



### ***The Lieutenant* by Kate Grenville.**

A historical novel which tells the story of First Fleet astronomer Lieutenant Rooke, whose friendship with a young Aboriginal girl changes his life forever. The story is based on the life of William Dawes and Kate Grenville has used Dawes' original diaries.

### ***The slap* by Christos Tsiolkas.**

A man slaps a misbehaving child at a suburban barbeque – a child not his own. The novel is based around the repercussions from this event, revealing much about the middle classes. A great book club read.

### ***Azincourt* by Bernard Cornwell.**

An hour by hour account of the battle of Agincourt. Nichols Hook, a forester, signs up with Henry V's army to fight at the battle.

***Cross country* by James Patterson.** Alex Cross pursues a Nigerian killer known as the Tiger to Africa after the brutal murder of his ex girlfriend.

### ***The private patient* by P.D. James.**

An investigative journalist is booked into a manor home for convalescence after surgery to remove a disfiguring facial scar. She is murdered and Inspector Dalgleish and his team are called in.

### ***Olivia* by Tim Ewbank.**

The personal story behind the famous face. Her career and personal story in the first full length biography on her life.

### ***Dewey* by Vicki Myron.**

Dewey is a Library cat who became a minor celebrity in his town Library, ensconced at the circulation desk. This is a must have gift for anyone who loves books and cats.

### ***True colours* by Adam Gilchrist.**

A very readable cricketing memoir by a likeable humble man who just happens to be Australia's greatest wicket keeper and batsman.

### ***Monsters: History's most evil men and women* by Simon Sebag Montefiore.**

Men and women who committed some of history's worst atrocities.

### ***Maggie's kitchen* by Maggie Beer.**

120 of Maggie's recipes.

### ***Amazing journeys of the world.***

Spectacular journeys along the world's famous routes.

### ***Felix* by Pamela Allen.**

Felix the cat finds the strawberry jam thief at the bottom of the jar and gets his head stuck in the process.

### ***Ten little fingers and ten little toes* by Mem Fox (Helen Oxenbury Ill.)**

# Mysterious ABS website reveals its hidden treasures : a report by Ainsley Backitch of Methodist Ladies' College.

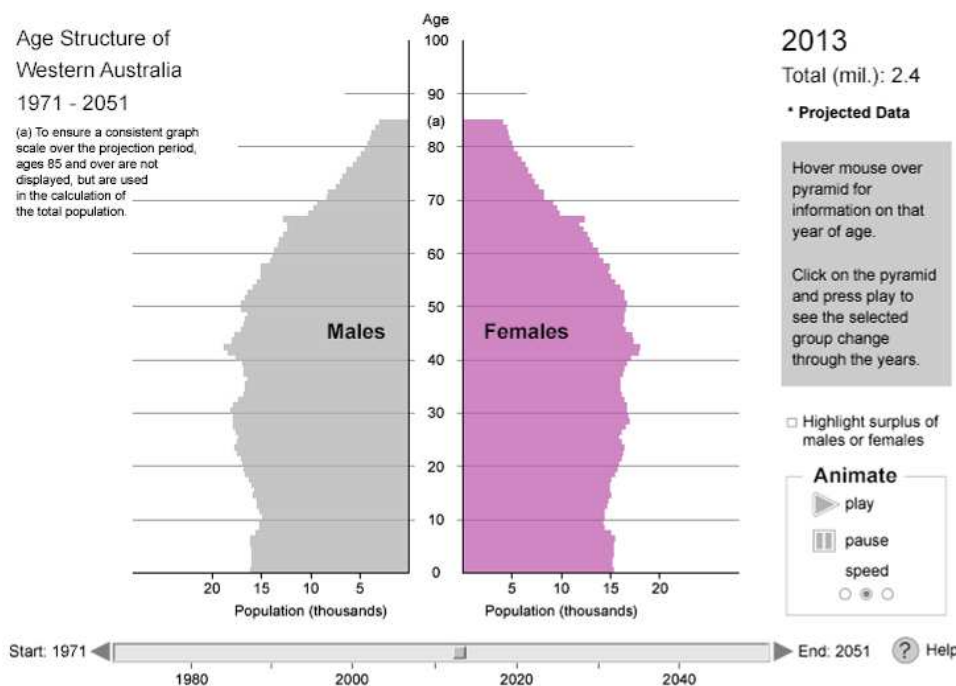
For teacher librarians, the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) has been an essential source of information for many years, providing access to data from various sources, including the census, though their publications, like the Year Book.

Since 1995, the ABS has had a presence on the internet (ABS, 2005, p. 186) and many of would have visited their site at some stage. Unfortunately the website, for a number of years, was difficult to navigate and resulted in many wasted hours looking for that elusive piece of information. There was also a stage, where some of their online publications required payment simply to view them. Luckily, this has all changed. The website has had a **face-lift** and, since 2005, all of the information available is **now free** (ABS, 2005, p. 213).

The session itself was quite informal and general but it did give attendees time to browse through the website under guidance while being shown some of the most useful features. The following is a brief summary of some useful or surprising features now found on the ABS website.

## General Features

One feature which I had not noticed before was that they now allow the user, where possible, to download the information in a variety of formats. On each web page there are a series of tabs across the top, one of which is called 'Downloads'. Under this tab, the ABS now allow downloads of the data in many different formats including Excel spreadsheets, zip and pdf.



Currently, the Education Services section of the ABS is hoping to better promote the website and all of its features to teachers through a number of workshops. On the 24<sup>th</sup> October, teacher librarians were invited to attend one of these information sessions and many took advantage of this opportunity.

## Animated Population Pyramids

*These can be found by clicking on the 'Australia's Population' link on the left hand side of the page and then looking under the 'States and Territories' section.*

These are population pyramids that have been animated to include past data for each state and also inferential data up until 2051. You can either manually move the year bar to see the changes or you can play it like a video to run through the complete animation. The other interesting feature is the ability to indicate surplus males or females through the years.

## Census Data



### QuickStats

This section is a summary of the much larger census. It allows you to select almost any area within Australia, including individual suburbs, postcodes and electoral divisions, to get results of the commonly examined topics. This is a great starting point.

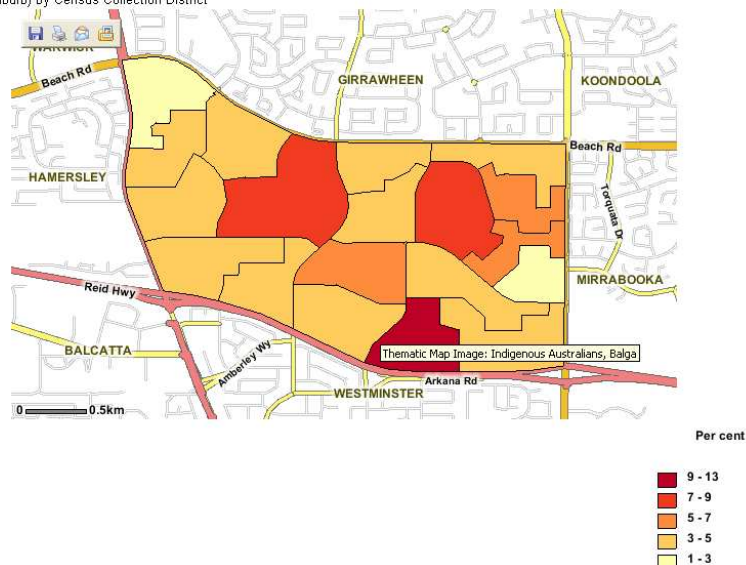


### MapStats

This section allows the user to create a geographic representation of the data from the last census. Again you can select almost any area within Australia to focus on for the results. In this area though, the user can select from any of the areas of the census not just the more common ones to examine. This tool also allows the user to break down the area into much smaller groupings called Census Collection Districts. These are the areas handled by one census collector and usually include around 230 homes. (ABS, 2006, p.10)

### Census Tables

The census tables area is another excellent way the ABS is now giving us access to the census data. Here, all information for a geographic area you select is presented in an Excel document. The document contains all of the census data for that area and because it is Excel, you can convert the data to a graphic representation. This would be excellent for students in the classroom who are learning to interpret data and different ways in which to present the findings.



### CensusAtSchool

The last area that was a real surprise was within the education area of the website. During 2008, the ABS ran a program called the CensusAtSchool project and invited schools from Australia to register and participate in a questionnaire. The answers from the questionnaire were collected and now that the project has finished for this year, students can examine the raw data for themselves.

## ABS website (cont.)

This is another great way for students to get involved in analyzing data for themselves. The most interesting aspect of this project is that it has been run successfully in several other countries and the questionnaire for all participating countries contains common questions so that students can compare results from the other countries. While this may not be of direct relevance for Teacher Librarians, it is well worth mentioning it to teachers.

### Overall

While the session may not have been what everyone attending was hoping for, it did however, give each person the chance to explore the website undisturbed. The ABS website is a huge undertaking by the organisation and does contain some excellent information. The presenter did concede that searching the site initially can return extensive results. The best advice for finding that elusive fact or figure is to use the menus provided and read each screen carefully.
